1.0 CALL TO ORDER:

Mayor Dagley called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

2.0 CHANGES / APPROVAL OF AGENDA

It was moved by Councillor Fiske and seconded by Deputy Mayor MacLeod that the Agenda be approved as presented:

MOTION CARRIED unanimously.

3.0 PRESENTATION(S):

3.1 Autism Nova Scotia – Cynthia Carroll and Barb Cochrane

Mayor Dagley welcomed Cynthia Carroll, Executive Director, Autism Nova Scotia and Barb Cochrane, Navigator & Volunteer, South Shore Chapter of Autism Nova Scotia to present to Council (copy of presentation attached to original set of Minutes).

Some highlights included:

- Community Story – In 2016, a vision of an inclusive playground was born. A committee was formed and approached Autism Nova Scotia's South Shore Chapter. Autism Nova Scotia is seeking a partnership with the Region to make this vision a reality.
- Autism Nova Scotia – Founded in 2002 and is a registered non-profit charity with eight Chapters province-wide.
- Autism Spectrum Disorder – Estimated 1 in 68 people, or over 1% of the population, has Autism Spectrum Disorder. It is a neurological condition affecting social communication and sensory processing and affects the person's entire lifespan.
- Why an Inclusive Playground – There is currently 200 students with Autism Spectrum Disorder within the South Shore Regional School Board, with over 1000 school-aged children with physical, developmental or other disabilities.
- What is an Inclusive Playground? – Inclusive playgrounds are provided for people of all ages and abilities. The 7 Principles of Inclusive Playground Design create play environments that increase playability for people of diverse abilities, age, race, gender, ethnicity, culture and socioeconomic status.
- Proposed Playground Site – 72 Old Cobbs Barn Road, located next to Queens Place Emera Centre in the corner section of the property. This location is away from water, has grass and natural areas, parking, skateboard park, Bike Track, washrooms and other services available. Other locations have also been investigated, with safety and accessibility being the key considerations when selecting the location.

- Together We Can – Requested support from the Region includes “in kind” use of land at 72 Old Cobb’s Road (\$39,000), ongoing support of the playground, including insurance, maintenance, services and utilities (\$15,000), and potential grant writing and fundraising support. Total value “in kind” is \$54,000. Total cost of project is \$464,242.

Mary White – Beach Meadows – Ms. White offered her comments for an alternate area for the proposed inclusive playground at 108 Pleasant Street, close to the community gardens and hospital.

Stan Clark – 48 Carters Beach Road, Port Mouton – Mr. Clark stated that he was in agreement with Ms. White for the location of the proposed playground and would be an investment for the community.

6.1 Council Minutes – January 23, 2018

THAT the minutes of the Regular Council meeting held January 23, 2018 be approved as circulated.

THAT the minutes of the Lighthouse Heritage Designation Hearing meeting held January 23, 2018 be approved as circulated.

8.0 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT:

8.1 Tourism Industry Trade Shows Pre-budget Approval

It was moved by Councillor Fralic and seconded by Councillor Kelly:

THAT the Council of the Region of Queens Municipality approve funds from the 2018-19 budget for the attendance at the Saltscapes Expo and South Shore Expo trade shows, in the amount of \$3,640.

Richard Lane, Economic Development Officer, provided background of the Saltscapes East Coast Expo Consumer and Trade Show, which will be held this year on April 20-22 at a new venue in Bayers Lake.

As in previous years, the Region will look to partner with local festivals and business, plus other members of the South Shore Tourism Team which will increase the Queens County presence for local businesses and festivals / events.

The South Shore Expo will be held at Queens Place Emera Center for its second year May 4 – 6, 2018.

11.0 FINANCE:

11.1 Resolution for Pre-Approval of Debenture

It was moved by Deputy Mayor MacLeod and seconded by Councillor Fiske:

THAT the Council of the Region of Queens Municipality approves the attached Borrowing Resolution for Main and School Street projects, for Pre-Approval to participate in the Spring 2018 Debenture Issuance.

Jennifer Keating-Hubley, Interim CAO / Director of Finance, stated the two projects for Main and School Streets which received funding through the Clean Water and Wastewater Fund were completed prior to March 2018, are now eligible to participate in the Spring 2018 Debenture Issuance.

MOTION CARRIED unanimously.

11.2 Bylaw 14 – Tax Exemptions, first reading

It was moved by Councillor Muise and seconded by Councillor Fancy:

THAT the Council of the Region of Queens Municipality gives first reading to a Bylaw respecting Tax Exemptions, copy attached.

Mrs. Keating-Hubley stated each year Council reviews properties that are included under the Region's Tax Exemption Bylaw. The list is essentially the same with the exception of the Milton Canoe & Camera Club, with the addition of a new site for their clubhouse (copy of proposed Bylaw 14 is attached to original set of Minutes).

MOTION CARRIED unanimously.

12.0 RECREATION AND COMMUNITY FACILITIES:

12.1 Tournament/Special Event Assistance Grant

It was moved by Councillor Fancy and seconded by Councillor Fralic:

THAT the Council of the Region of Queens Municipality approve a Tournament/Special Event Assistance Grant in the amount of \$500.00 to the Western Hurricanes Major Bantam Hockey Club to be funded from the Community Grants and Programs budget line of the Recreation and Healthy Communities Department.

Meaghan Roberts, Director of Recreation & Healthy Communities, stated a request for funding was received from the Western Hurricanes Major Bantam Hockey Club to assist with the league provincials being held March 22 – 25, 2018 at Queens Place Emera Centre. There will be 7 teams (150 players) along with coaches and family. This request fits the criteria of this grant program.

MOTION CARRIED unanimously.

12.2 Selection of Two Representative Volunteers

It was moved by Councillor Kelly and seconded by Councillor Fralic:

THAT the Council of the Region of Queens Municipality nominate Kerry Gallant of Liverpool and Carolyn Conrad of Caledonia as the Region of Queens 2018 Volunteers of the Year.

AND THAT they will represent the Region of Queens Municipality at the Provincial Volunteer Awards Ceremony to be recognized with an award for their commitment to volunteerism.

Heather Cook, Community Development Coordinator, stated that members of the community submit names through the Ripple Effect Volunteer Recognition program and each year two volunteers are selected to attend the Provincial Volunteer Awards Ceremony in Halifax, and this year the ceremony is April 8, 2019. National Volunteer Week takes place April 15 – 22, 2018.

MOTION CARRIED unanimously.

12.3 Update – Municipal Physical Activity Leader (MPAL)

Norm Amirault, Municipal Physical Activity Leader, provided an update to Council.

Some highlights included:

- Reviewed the MPAL program,
- Reviewed the purpose of the MPAL,
- Reviewed the 2010 Physical Activity Strategy for Queens,
- Provided the Provincial expectations,
- Explained the role of the Director of Recreation, and how the MPAL position interacts with the Director,
- Provided information on the activities to date; i.e. community engagement,
- Provided council with a list of ideas for potential projects and activities,
- Discussed challenges, i.e. focus, resources, what will yield results and behavioural change.

He asked members of Council and the public to provide him with ideas on:

- What the MPAL can do in Queens,
- Who can help the MPAL achieve goals from ideas provided,
- Programs and places that would benefit from the MPAL, and
- Provide any resources or grants that can be applied for around wellness.

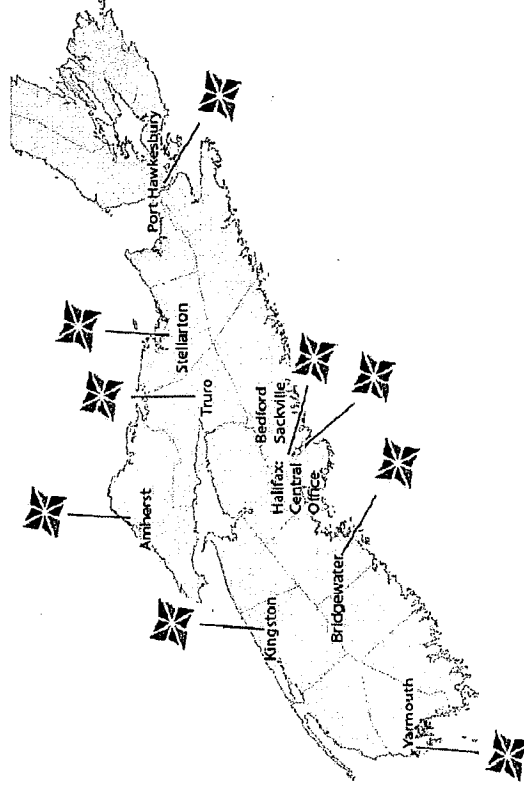
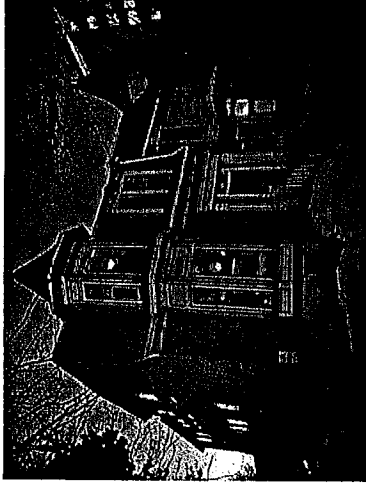


A community story

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Nova Scotians are committed to creating inclusive communities

- Nova Scotia has set a goal to be accessible by 2030 under the Accessibility Act passed April 27, 2017.
- Nova Scotia is only the third province in Canada to pass accessibility legislation. The passage of Bill 59 will start the process of removing barriers for persons with disabilities.
- Inclusion is an attitude and a value system that promotes the basic rights of all students to receive appropriate and quality educational programming and services in the company of their peers.
- **By partnering in with Autism Nova Scotia to create a truly inclusive playground in Liverpool, the Region of Queens will be a leader in creating accessible communities in the province.**

- Inclusive playgrounds promote meaningful play experiences provided for people of all ages and abilities.
- The 7 Principles of Inclusive Playground Design™ create universally designed play environments that increase the “playability” for people of diverse abilities, age, race, gender, ethnicity, culture, and socioeconomic status.
- Regardless of ability, play addresses the developmental needs of the whole child by intentionally providing opportunities for physical, cognitive, communicative, social/emotional, and sensory development. **Play is for everyone!**

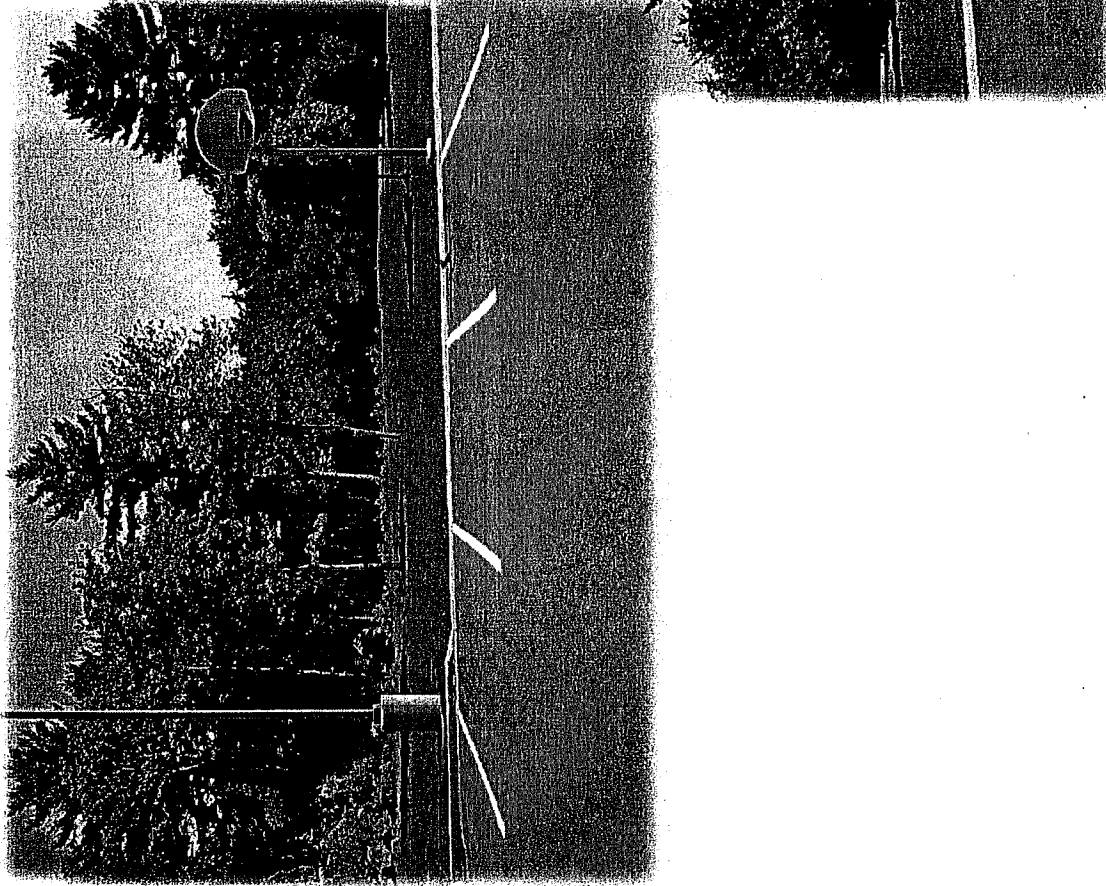


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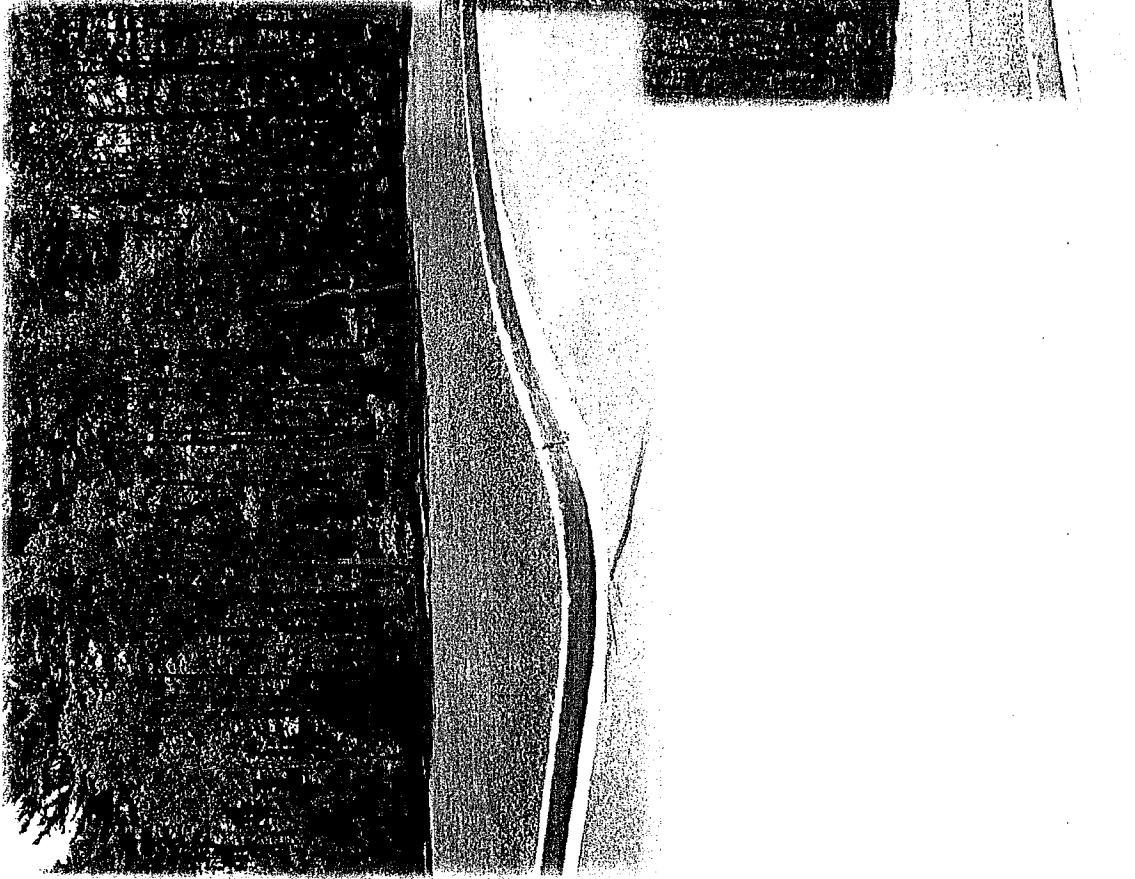


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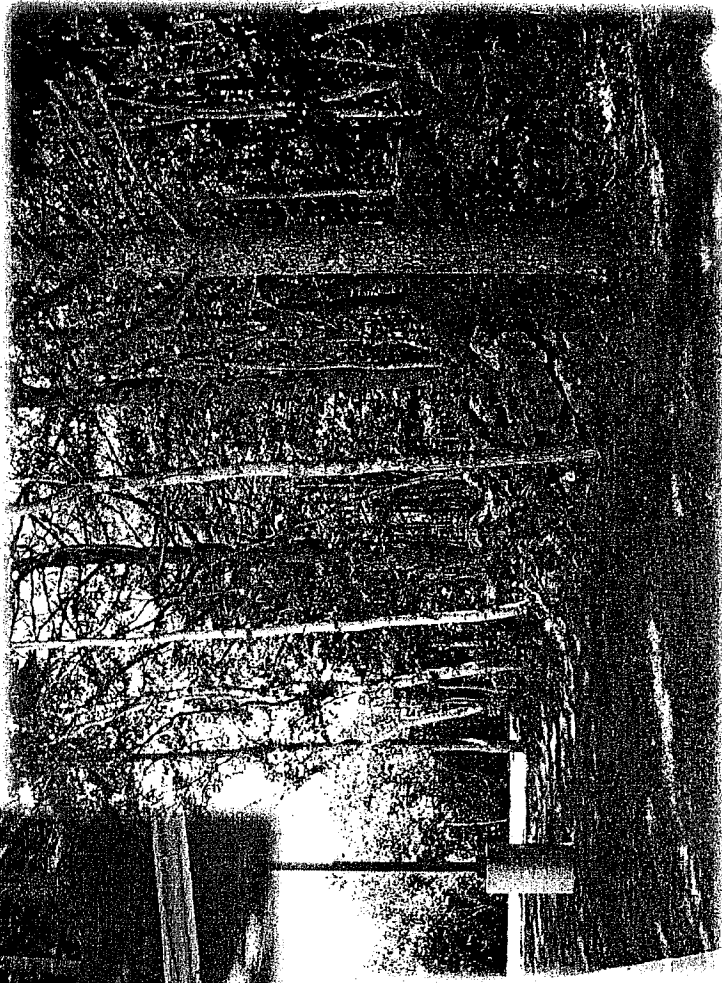
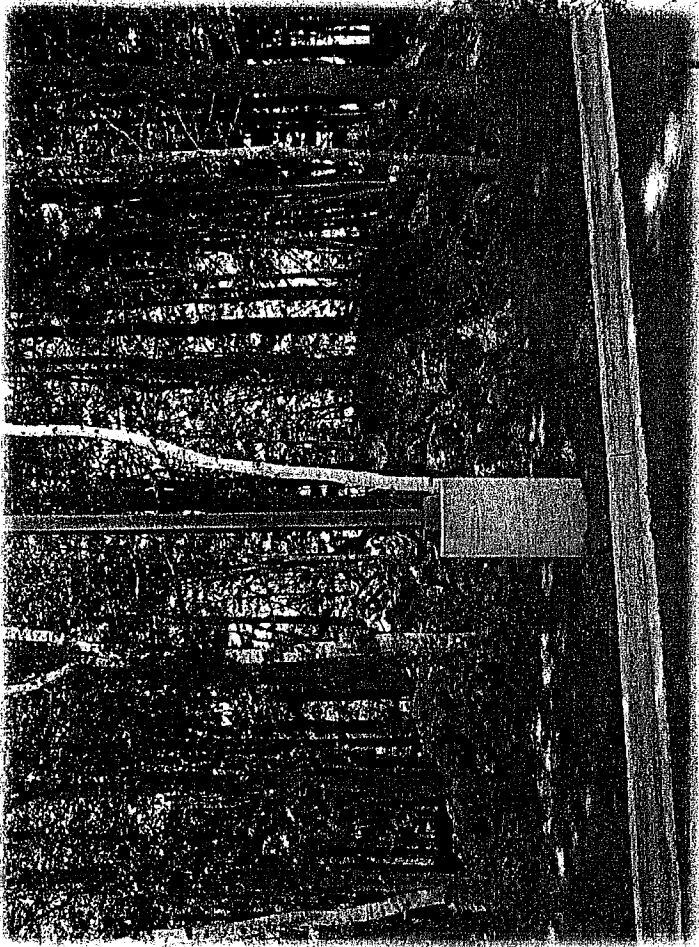
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Other locations considered

Safety and accessibility were the key considerations when selecting the location for the inclusive playground.

It had to be close to parking, yet far enough from busy streets in case a child should bolt when outside the fence.

Bodies of water are a significant hazard especially for children with autism, so it needed to be away from rivers and lakes.

Alternate locations considered:

- Milton by the swimming pool – little access to services
- Pine Grove Park - limited open space, next to the river, limited services
- Hank Snow Park, Hillside Road, Brooklyn - on a busy road, limited parking and services
- Privateer Waterfront Park, Liverpool - open park area along the river

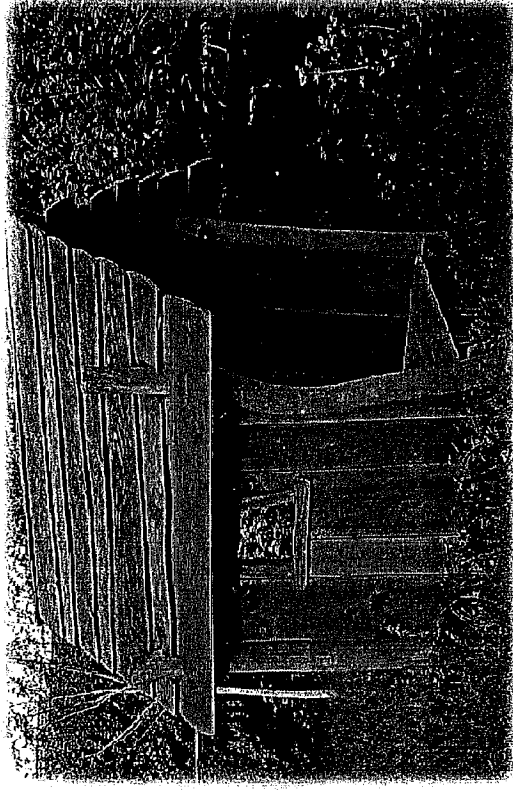
Sample Equipment and Features

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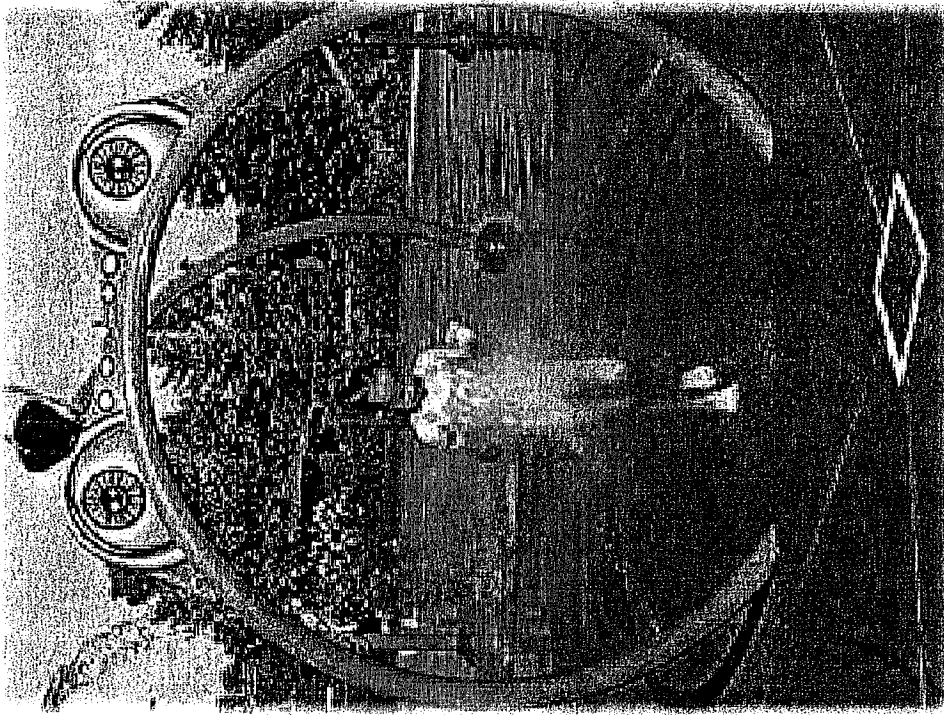

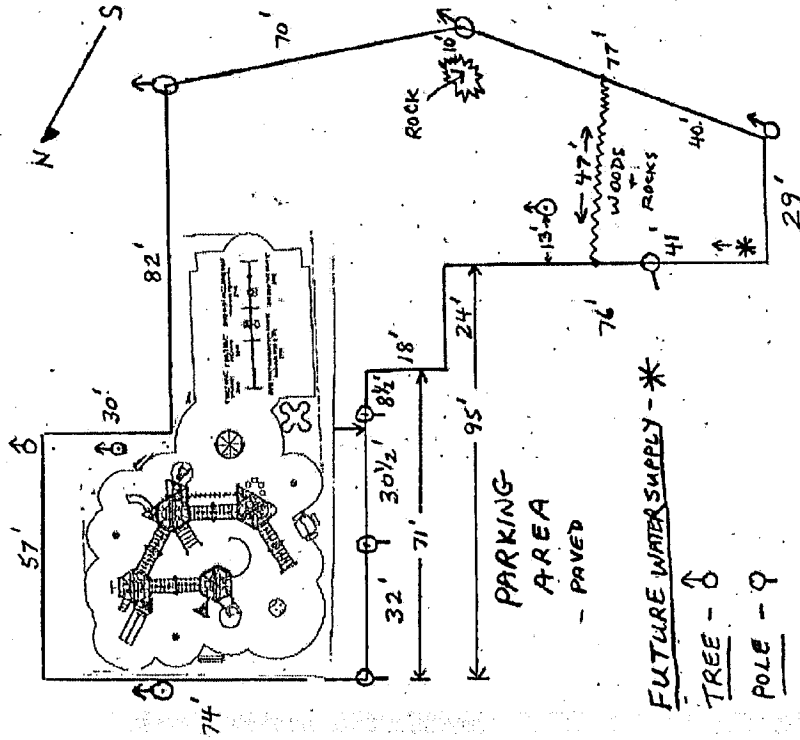


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Splash Pads

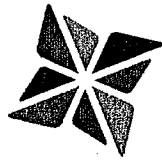

Resolution for Pre-Approval of Debenture Issuance Subject to Interest Rate

WHEREAS Section 91 of the *Municipal Government Act* provides that a municipality is authorized to borrow money, subject to the approval of the Minister of Municipal Affairs (hereinafter "the Minister);

AND WHEREAS the resolution of council to borrow for wastewater facilities and stormwater systems and water systems was approved by the Minister March 23, 2017;

AND WHEREAS clause 91(1)(b) of the *Municipal Government Act* authorizes the council to determine the amount and term of, and the rate of interest, on each debenture, when the interest on a debenture is to be paid, and where the principal and interest on a debenture are to be paid;

AND WHEREAS clause 91(2) of the *Municipal Government Act* states, that in accordance with the *Municipal Finance Corporation Act*, the mayor or warden and clerk or the person designated by the council, by policy, shall sell and deliver the debentures on behalf of the municipality at the price, in the sums and in the manner deemed proper;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED

THAT under the authority of Section 91 of the *Municipal Government Act*, the Region of Queens Municipality borrow by the issue and sale of debentures a sum or sums not exceeding \$530,000.00, for a period not to exceed 10 years, subject to the approval of the Minister;

THAT the sum be borrowed by the issue and sale of debentures of the Region of Queens Municipality in the amount that the mayor or warden and clerk or the person designated by the council deems proper, provided the average interest rate of the debenture does not exceed the rate of 5.5%;

THAT the debenture be arranged with the Nova Scotia Municipal Finance Corporation with interest to be paid semi-annually and principal payments made annually;

THAT this resolution remains in force for a period not exceeding twelve months from the passing of this resolution.

BYLAW NO. 14**A BYLAW RESPECTING TAX EXEMPTIONS**

BE IT ENACTED by the Council of the Region of Queens Municipality, under the authority of the *Municipal Government Act*, S.N.S. 1998, Chapter 18, as follows:

1. This Bylaw shall be known as Bylaw Number 14 and may be cited as "The Tax Exemption Bylaw".
2. The property of the organizations, or institutions named in Schedule "A" that would otherwise be classified as commercial, residential or resource property shall be totally exempt from taxation, including area rates, in the Region of Queens Municipality and the property of the organizations, or institutions named in Schedule "B" that would otherwise be classified as commercial property shall be partially exempt from taxation, including area rates, and will be required to pay the residential rate of taxes in the Region of Queens Municipality.
3. Where a property or part thereof, listed in Schedule "A" or "B", ceases to be occupied by the association or for the purposes set out in the Schedule, partial or total exemption from taxation shall cease and the owner of the property shall immediately be liable for the real property tax on such property or part thereof for the portion of the year then unexpired.
4. This bylaw shall be reviewed on an annual basis, to examine the tax-exempt status of the properties exempted by this bylaw.
5. This bylaw shall have effect in the municipal taxation year commencing on April 1, 2018.

REPEAL

6. The Tax Exemption Bylaw adopted by the Council of the Region of Queens Municipality on 28th day of March, 2017, is hereby repealed.

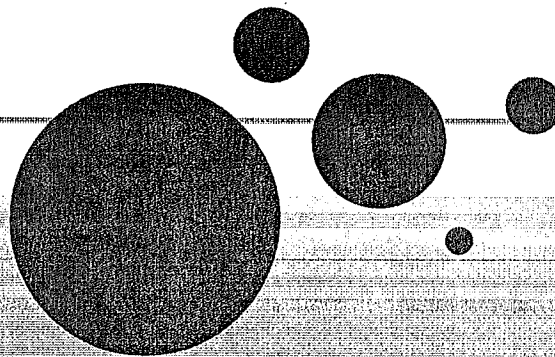

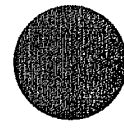
MUNICIPAL PHYSICAL ACTIVITY LEADERSHIP PROGRAM
