Your civic number is vital in emergencies, and useful for services like deliveries, as well as utility providers, such as Nova Scotia Power, and cable and telephone.

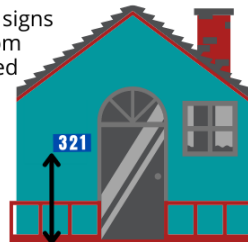
A few things to remember:

- Use Arabic Numerals, displayed horizontally
- Display on the same side of the road as the property or building
- Place signage at least 1.2 meters above ground if on a building, or at least 0.6 meters above ground if placed elsewhere on property
- Use a high contrast between numerals and the material they are posted upon. Numerals should be reflective for viewing at night
- Numerals should face the roadway, and sufficiently close to the road for easy viewing, both day and night



If roadside, civic number signs shall be clearly visible from both directions, and placed on the same side of the road as the property or building

If on house, place at least 1.2 metres from ground



White numbers on high contrast background, and reflective at night

If roadside, place close enough to see day or night

0.6 metres from ground



HOW CIVIC NUMBERS ARE ASSIGNED

Roads within the Municipality are broken down into measured intervals and civic numbers are determined by where a driveway intersects with the road.

The Municipality currently has over 7,883 civic numbers assigned through all of Queens County.

HOW TO APPLY FOR A CIVIC NUMBER

Applying for a civic number is easy and free.
